Our current Chair, Debbie McConnell, will reach the end of her term in office in September 2023 and we are looking to recruit a successor as soon as possible to enable an extended handover period for the new candidate.

About CPRE Lancashire, Liverpool City Region and Greater Manchester

At CPRE, the countryside charity, we want a thriving, beautiful countryside for everyone. We believe in countryside and green spaces that are accessible to all, rich in nature and playing a crucial role in responding to the climate emergency.

We are the local CPRE group for Lancashire, Liverpool City Region and Greater Manchester, and with our colleagues in other counties and at National CPRE, we're advocating for the kind of countryside we all want: one with sustainable, healthy communities and available to more people than ever, including those who haven't benefited before.

We stand for a countryside that enriches all of our lives, regenerating our wellbeing, and that we in turn regenerate, protect and celebrate.

Our people

The charity currently has five Trustees. Our directly employed staff team includes one full-time, qualified Planner and three part-time members of staff on a two-year National Lottery Heritage Funded project, the GM Ringway Project. Admin and communications support staff work on a contractor basis.

We have a team of volunteers across our area who monitor and respond to planning applications, supported by our planning staff.

Our campaigns

CPRE aims to achieve the best use of land by influencing land-use planning policies and planning decisions taken at national, local and neighbourhood level including:

reducing our carbon emissions;



- avoiding the use of green belt, the countryside and other designated landscapes for inappropriate development;
- advocating "brownfield first" in land use;
- campaigns focused on food and farming, affordable rural housing, transport, energy (shale gas fracking and renewables), and waste.

Our projects

In addition to our work responding to planning applications and helping to shape Local Plans across the area, we undertake project work to support broadening access to the countryside and green spaces for disadvantaged and marginalised communities.

Knowsley Project

In 2021, we received funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund as part of a group bid from CPRE to support children from disadvantaged areas of Knowsley to access the countryside and spend time outdoors growing food and learning about the heritage of a local historic park.

Hedgerows Project

Hedgerows are the vital stitching in the patchwork of our countryside. Not only are they beautiful, with shifting seasonal colours, but they also provide homes and corridors for wildlife. And all the while they help tackle the climate crisis by capturing carbon.

As part of CPRE's wider #40by50 campaign, we are working with The Conservation Volunteers to plant 2km of hedgerows in our area over autumn and winter 2022/3, working with primary schools and local volunteer groups to get people out into the countryside and provide practical training on planting and maintaining hedgerows.

GM RIngway Project

CPRE Lancashire, Liverpool City Region and Greater Manchester successfully bid for £250,000 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to implement the GM Ringway, a new 300 km walking trail which passes through some of the most spectacular scenery in each of Greater Manchester's ten boroughs. Green in every sense, each stage is accessible by public transport.

Events

We organise regular walks across our region, as well as talks and workshops (both online and in person) on topics of relevance such as soil health, biodiversity, affordable housing, and environmental issues.

Partnerships

We work with a range of aligned groups to support groups in responding to planning applications and local plans.

As chair you'll provide leadership to our board of trustees and oversee the future direction and development of our charity. You'll ensure that the



requirements of the constitution are met and that our governance complies with charity law and best practice.

We're ideally looking for someone with leadership and charity board experience and a passion for environmental and countryside issues.

The role of Chair is voluntary, but out-of-pocket expenses can be covered.

Time commitment: a minimum of 1 to 1.5 days per week

What you will be doing

- Providing strategic leadership to our charity and supporting fundraising, membership and engagement initiatives

- · Safeguarding the good name and values of our charity
- · Advocating the work of CPRE through public speaking and media interviews
- · Providing or arranging line management of any employees
- · Chairs also represent our charity by being the voting member at national CPRE
- · Ensuring board and subgroup meetings and our AGM are held on a regular basis
